CATALOGUE DESCRIPTION

This capstone course is the culmination of a collection of courses and experiences related to international family therapy. The course provides an opportunity for students to integrate their international knowledge and experience into local practice through service delivery to transnational communities.

COURSE OBJECTIVES

Students in this course will further their understanding of:

- 1. The impact of globalization on local communities and families;
- 2. The role family therapists can play in promoting resilience among casualties of globalization, e.g., survivors of war and torture, human trafficking, forced migration;
- 3. Liberation based practices that target empowerment, accountability, and inclusion at a global level; and
- 4. A specific local immigrant or refugee group affected by globalization.

COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course helps students apply what they have learned via international coursework to their local contexts through their professional practice. The course includes readings, lectures and discussions aimed at furthering students' knowledge of practicing family therapy from a "glocal" perspective. Students work independently and together throughout the course to effectively apply international family therapy frameworks to community practice.

COURSE REQUIREMENTS AND EVALUATION

Each student will design a learning project with the instructor. This project serves to bring together international coursework and experience in ways that further learning and demonstrate outcomes of participation in the family therapy international track. Examples inculde:

- Writing a grant proposal in support of international partnership or research
- Completing a video or written reflection project
- Service learning through professional work in another country or in our local community with focus on transnational populations
