Overview:

This course will help you develop a strong knowledge base, critical thinking, and ethical decision-making skills in all aspects of your counseling work. In our class, you will learn about specific ethical and legal issues and develop ways of thinking that enhance your professionalism. You will be challenged to increase your level of awareness, sensitivity, and understanding of ethical principles in counseling. The goals for this class are to **increase your achievement of high levels of ethical awareness and help develop strong ethical performance** in your professional counseling.

Readings:

Most of our class discussions and assignments will be from readings in our textbook. The assigned chapters offer a wide scope and understanding with many illustrations of ethical challenges. As new counselors entering a very complex and highly ambiguous field, it is critically important to recognize and understand the ethical dimensions of our profession. As you will see, strong ethics are the foundation for competent counseling service delivery. This class will help develop your professional ethics and enhance your skills and competence with the primary goal being the safety of your future clients. In this course, you are expected to keep up with the assigned readings and to actively contribute in each and every class session.

Class Assignments:

Participation in Weekly Class Discussions (18 Points @ 2 points for each class)

Submit rubric provided by Instructor in Moodle by 11:30 p.m. at the end of each class.

In this class, our expectations are that every student will share questions and ideas in each class session. We want you to find your voice and express yourself. Since we rely heavily on student participation in class discussions, **missing** a class means earning **no** discussion question points for that evening.

Discussion Questions (45 Points - Submit in Moodle by 11:30 p.m. on the day of class):

For each class, you will write two (2) discussion questions. These questions will come from your assigned chapters. Your questions and their answers will form the foundation of our class discussions. Your discussion questions are due at the **beginning** of each class. The discussion questions are worth 5 points (2.5 points for each question).

Reflection Statements (9 Points - Submit in Moodle by 11:30 p.m. on the day of class):

For each class, you will write one reflection statement. These statements will be based on your thoughts, reactions, and the integration of information discussed in our classes. You will be asked to consider the topics discussed, and write a brief example, reaction or reflection on the relevance of that topic. You will also discuss any practical applications of those topics and ideas, as well as their importance to your future practice and specialty. These statements are worth 1 point.

Important Influences Exercise (10 Points – Submit in Moodle by 11:30 p.m. the day of presentation):

Ethics are inspired and influenced by many events, places and people in our lives. You will create a 10-minute class presentation, selecting from a variety of options, illustrating important influences on your professional ethics. Students can earn up to **10 points** for your construction and presentation of this individual exercise. Students will select the week for your brief presentations. Group presentation days are listed on the class schedule.

Final Exam (10 Points):

We will have one final exam. Final Exam in week 9 covering material from the semester. The exam will occur in class via Moodle.

Article on Ethics (8 Points - Submit in Moodle by 11:30 p.m. on the last day of class):

You will select an article and lead a brief, 10-minute group discussion on this ethics topic of your choice. Please upload the article in Moodle.

Grading: For a total of up to **100 points** on your final grade, scoring will be:
