Dr. Teresa McDowell receives the Anselm Strauss Award (pictured to the left with Dr.
Goodsell, Chair of the award committee). The award, given by the National Council on Family Relations (NCFR), selects "authors of a qualitative journal article or book chapter published during the previous year which, in the estimation of the members of the committee, makes the most significant contribution to the area of family theory, methods, and/or research that comes from a qualitative tradition."

Teaming with Marisol Garcia, featured in last month's newsletter, Dr. McDowell published, "Mapping Social Capital: A Critical Contextual Approach for Working with Low-Status Families". The committee identified many strengths in the article, particularly that it "goes beyond a basic ecosystemic model [...] It engages the Bourdieuian tradition of social capital to show how the family interacts with other systems in dynamic ways, and also to show how the social structures in which families are embedded entail both subjective and objective components to build an understanding of social action." The committee has high hopes for the article's impact "as a model for theory and research in the qualitative family tradition."

The award was presented to Dr. McDowell at the 73rd Annual Conference of NCFR in Orlando in November. Congratulations Dr. McDowell! We are SO proud to have you on our MCFT team!

MCFT Faculty deserves recognition and a HUGE round of applause for their hard work in gaining funding for the following MCFT projects:

- Support for the Marriage, Couple, and Family Therapy Program to continue to build professional relationships with universities and clinical therapy training programs in India.
- Development of an interdisciplinary course on crime-victim resilience as related to coordinated
 and integrated legal and therapeutic interventions. This integrated curriculum—the only course of
 its kind in the country—would teach law and family therapy students an interdisciplinary approach
 to services for victims.
- Collaboration between graduate school faculty and two Colombian universities to develop research projects on international family therapy that explore how therapy interventions are shaped by culture and social issues in the U.S. and Colombia.

MCFT's Elizabeth Parker and Kyle Zrenchik impact students through their work with Roosevelt High School's Gay-

Straight Alliance. Started just one year earlier, Liz and Kyle have seen significant changes as the program continues to grow. In the beginning, GSA was primarily made up of heterosexual, Caucasian women in their Senior year, however the group now represents more queer, ethnic minority students in their Freshmen and Sophomore year.

As the students have become more diverse, their involvement in the community has expanded. The 15 students that make up the GSA attend community functions such as the Portland Aids Walk and the recent anti-bullying event featuring famous rugby player, Ben Cohen. Their next event is Gay Skate at Oaks Park on December 19th (open to the public!).

Several students had the opportunity to participate in an especially exciting project coordinated by Kyle and KBOO, 90.7 FM. Featured on their radio show, "Out Loud", Kyle interviewed four students on their experience with GSA highlighting what it meant to be a part of the social movement. Kyle wanted to "give the listening audience the chance to listen to queer youth; the youth perspective from North Portland because they are not as connected to the queer community in Portland".

Roosevelt's GSA has also just received a grant from Parents and Friends of Lesbians and Gays which they plan to use toward a multimedia project in an anti-bullying campaign. Their work has had obvious effects on the students as GSA becomes more involved and their goals more recognized in the community, but it has had equal positive outcomes for their mentors. Kyle shares, "I still feel what they're saying, I get what they're saying. Roosevelt High School is very much like the one I grew up in and I understand what they're saying. It's heartbreaking but it's when I'm at my best". To the same effect, Liz says, "The need is so big on a systemic level; the need for creating safe spaces. Being a part of that is important to me, knowing I'm in a position where I can make change. I feel like we're doing good work and needed work."
