Course Description

Introduces counselors, therapists and other helping professionals to community-level strategies for addressing social injustice through system change, advocacy, and social movement building. Draws on community psychology, political economy, sociology of social movements, and ideology theory to deepen understanding of power and social transformation.

Course Objectives

- Gain familiarity with the fields of community psychology, community development, and social movement studies
- Examine and evaluate various forms of social change strategies
- Identify roles for counselors and therapists in relation to social movements and social transformation

Requirements
