

Cross-Cultural Educational Experience, LLC. An Experiential Seminar

Bridging the Distances Between Mexican Families and American Schools. Lewis & Clark College

CCEE offers a solid academic and experiential trip for a group of educators with interests in cultural competency. Participants will travel to locations in Mexico with the purpose of having an immersion experience within the local culture. Participants will have the opportunity to overview history and the impact it plays on the current culture. They will attend & participate in targeted experiences around the Mexican education system, having first-hand contact with students and educators. The participants will develop awareness and a better understanding of the opportunities and challenges faced by different Hispanic social groups.

Lectures & Discussions:

- **Conquest of a Culture:** To better understand the Pre-Hispanic Cultures in Mexico and their historical impact on its modern-day society, as well as the impact of the Spanish conquest and how that differs from colonization.
- Social Class and the history of Mexico: Identify the differences between Spaniards, "Criollos" and Indians, and understand the mestizo history and its impact through the centuries.
- Hispanic Traits Today: Analyze Mexican organizational systems, culture, and history, and how these factors have impacted current events. Understand why large groups of Latin-Americans, and especially Mexicans, think and behave the way they do?



Immigrants: Brief history of "braceros", or

Mexican immigration. Analyze Mexican integration into the United States, as well as the challenges and opportunities working with Hispanics families & students.

 The Mexican Education System: Understand the main differences between the Mexican and American educational systems, and the relationship between social class and educational access.

Experiences*

- A unique cultural experience tied to the Mexican people and their history and customs.
- Visits to a variety of educational institutions that serve different socioeconomic groups.
- Interactions and exchanges with Mexican students and educators.
- Exposure to alternative approaches to building parent and community involvement.
- Visit to an indigenous community school.

Activities:

Mexico City:

- National Anthropology Museum, Fine Arts Palace, Historic Centre of Mexico City*, pre-Hispanic city of Teotihuacan*, Xochimilco* and Coyoacan plaza.
- Various Mexican cuisine experiences

Puebla City:

• City Centre⁻ a magnificent example of Baroque architecture and art. Visits to cultural sites such as Cholula, Cacaxtla and Chalchihuapan.

What Services Are Included:

- Ground transportation in Mexico City and Puebla.
- Seven night, single room accommodations.
- All meals with some special "meal experiences".

What is not Included:

- Costs associated with passports.
- Port of entry visa fees (if applicable).
- International departure taxes.
- International airfare.
- Ground transportation beyond the organized activities.

- Entrance fees to venues, including the National Folkloric Ballet in the Palace of Fine Arts, museums and archeological sites.
- Academic lectures and focus groups.
- Food and beverages beyond the ones outlined in the plan.
- Baggage charges.
- Porterage, tips, and any incidental expenses.

Program Logistics & Requirements

Options 2017: May $20^{th} - 27^{th}$ or October $21^{st} - 28^{th}$ (Oct. dates to be confirmed). All participants are required to attend a pre-travel workshop in Portland, Oregon.

Cultural site visit: Guadalupe Basilica

Experience a rich site with profound cultural traditions.

With more than 20 million annual visitors, the Shrine of Guadalupe in Mexico City is one of the top Catholic pilgrimage sites in the world. It is the most venerated Icon among Hispanic cultures of Latin America, regardless of socio-economic status or religion.

Private school visit: Instituto Mexico



Newcomer experience, learning from a different educational model.

Catholic schools have had extensive influence in Mexican education, eventhough the Mexican constitution doesn't allow for religious schools. Currently, new, nonreligious entities are emerging. Community Involvement Organization Site visit: Asamblea Comunitaria Miravalles



Experience the scope of parent and community involvement, and its influence on neighborhood well-being.

Located in a highly depressed area in Mexico City. A community also referred to as "garbage sorters", are highly involved with school leaders on behalf of their community. Their focus is a socio-cultural partnership in education, work access, food services, ecology, and culture. (This organization received the Urban Age Deutsche B. in 2010).

- Visit to see the different services that this organization offers.

Public elementary and middle school visit: Valle del Paraiso Neighborhood in Puebla



Participate in meaningful exchange with students, teachers & school leaders.

Suburban public schools typically serve depressed areas of low-wage workers. These regions lack necessary infrastructure.

- Conversations with students
- Afternoon meal and professional exchange with teachers and administrators

Visit to a migrant community: Chalchihuapan Puebla



Understand reasons and hardships of migrant families. Have conversations with second generation migrants, their teachers regarding the cultural struggles they face.


A highly fragmented and mobile community due to family members migrating to the USA. The school-age population of this community is largely made up of students with parents abroad, students who have returned from the USA, and other students who desire to move abroad.

- A panel conversation with migrant teenagers.
- Professional exchange group with teachers and administrators.



Cultural Competency Why does it matter?

- ✓ The Hispanic population in the USA has surpassed 55 million.
- ✓ Hispanics make up the our nation's largest minority, constituting 17% of the country's total population.
- ✓ There are 10.5 million Hispanic/Latino children under the age of 18, and it is America's fastest growing youth population.
- ✓ By 2020 more than one in five children will be of Hispanic/Latino origin.
- ✓ By 2060, the Census Bureau projects that Hispanic people will comprise over 28% of the total population, with 65% of those Hispanics having Mexican heritage.



There are five basic cultural competency skill areas, relative to educators who work in the educational system as a whole. Growth in one area tends to support growth in another (Adapted from Diller and Moule, Cultural Competence: A Primer for Educators, Thomson Wadsworth 2005):

- **Valuing Diversity**. Accepting and respecting differences—different cultural backgrounds and customs, different ways of communicating, and different traditions and values.
- Being Culturally Self-Aware. Culture—the sum total of an individual's experiences, knowledge, skills, beliefs, values, and interests—shapes educators' sense of who they are and where they fit in their family, school, community, and society.
- **Dynamics of Difference**. Knowing what can go wrong in cross-cultural communication and how to respond to these situations.
- **Knowledge of Students' Culture**. Educators must have some base knowledge of their students' culture so that student behaviors can be understood in their proper cultural context.
- Institutionalizing Cultural Knowledge and Adapting to Diversity. Culturally competent educators, and the institutions they work in, can take a step further by institutionalizing cultural knowledge so they can adapt to diversity and better serve diverse populations.
