Overview:

This course will help you develop a strong knowledge base, critical thinking and ethical decision making skills in all aspects of your counseling work. In our class, you will learn about specific ethical and legal issues and develop ways of thinking that enhance your professionalism. You will be challenged to increase your level of awareness, sensitivity, and understanding of ethical principles in counseling. The goals for this class are to increase your achievement of high levels of ethical awareness and help develop strong ethical performance in your professional counseling.

Readings:

Most of our class discussions and assignments will be from readings in our textbook. The assigned chapters offer a wide scope and understanding with many illustrations of ethical challenges. As new counselors entering a very complex and highly ambiguous field, it is critically important to recognize and understand the ethical dimensions of our profession. As you will see, strong ethics are the foundation for competent counseling services. This class will help develop your professional ethics and enhance your skills and competence with the primary goal being the safety of your future clients. In this course, you are expected to keep up with the assigned readings and to actively contribute in each and every class session.

Class assignments:

<u>Participation in weekly class discussions</u>: In this class, our expectations are that every student will share questions and ideas in each class session. We want you to find your voice and express yourself. Since we rely heavily on student participation in class discussions, missing a class means earning no discussion question points for that evening.

<u>Discussion questions:</u> For each class, you will write two (2) discussion questions. These questions, written on 3 X 5 inch index cards, will come from your assigned chapters. Your questions <u>and their answers</u> will form the foundation of our class discussions. Due at the beginning of each class, you will receive partial credit for late cards. These cards will be worth up to 2 points each (maximum of 4 points per class), for a total of 18 cards (36 points) during the semester.

Reflection cards: For each class, you will also write one (1) reflection card. These statements, on 3 X 5 cards, will be based on your thoughts, reactions, and the integration of information discussed in our classes. You will be asked to consider the topics discussed, and write a brief reaction or reflection on the relevance of that topic. You may also discuss practical applications of those ideas and their importance to your future practice and specialty. These cards are worth **1** point each, for **9** points in the semester.

Important influences exercise: Ethics are inspired and influenced by many events, places and people in our lives. You will create a 10 minute class presentation, selecting from a variety of options, illustrating important influences on your professional ethics. Students can earn up to **10 points** for your construction and presentation of this individual exercise. Students will select the week for your brief presentations. More information will follow.

<u>Mid-terms I, II, and III</u>: We will have three mid-term exams, one in week 4 **(15 points)**, one in week 7 **(15 points)**, and one in week 9 **(10 points)**, covering material in that segment of class.

Article on Ethics: You will select an article and lead a brief, 10 minute class discussion on this ethics topic of your choice. Please provide a copy for each of your instructors **(5 points)**.

Grading: For a total of up to **100 points** on your final grade, scoring will proceed as follows:

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A = 100 \text{ to } 93 \text{ points} A - = 92 \text{ to } 90 \text{ points} B + = 89 \text{ to } 87 \text{ points} B = 86 \text{ to } 83 \text{ points} C + = 79 \text{ to } 77 \text{ points} C = 76 \text{ to } 73 \text{ points} C - = 72 \text{ to } 70 \text{ points}
